ABOUT AROO

In the late 1950s, two Giulietta Spider Veloce's came to Portland. They were featured on a local TV show to promote a sports car race

which they dominated, winning converts in the growing sports car scene. As interest and knowledge of Alfas grew, Alfa fans — known as "Alfisti" — began to gather at Rambo Motors, the new Alfa dealer in Portland, which trained mechanics and supported a racing team. In the early 1960s, Bob Rinde, Rambo's sales manager, joined the national Alfa Romeo Owners Club and others followed. By October 1968 there was enough local interest for Bob McGill to apply to start a chapter, making AROO the sixth AROC-US chapter.



As I complete this final-for-me AlfaBits President's Column, I reflect over the passage of time, events and people since the winter of 2016 when I took "the helm" from then retiring AROO President David Rice.

Our club has never been stronger, despite the considerable stresses posed on it by the pandemic – we have soldiered on,

our board of directors taking on additional work, innovating new ways to function despite all odds. I can't thank our board enough for their ongoing support and volunteerism!

I look back to George Kraus completing his five-year commitment as AlfaBits Editor: first to resurrect the Alfabits in 2015, and then to continue to improve it during those five years. In the last two years James Parker has done an admirable job continuing to produce one of the best and most consistent local chapter digital magazines in the US Alfa club.

Our long-time tour stalwarts – Dave Beach, Bill Gillham, Dennis Howell and Tom McGirr – continue to entertain us with amazing roads, fun stops and facts, great food and camaraderie with their various tours. Compared to other local chapters, AROO is one of the most "driving" clubs in the US, and it is these individuals who make that so true – thank you each and all!

We are excited to begin planning our return to in-person dinner meetings, as conditions permit. Chris Bright is working on a very interesting presentation in January. We are also searching for a suitable venue, preferably centrally located for our Jan-May, and Sept-Nov dinner meetings – if you are aware of a potential venue, please let one of us know!

Yulia Smolyansky and Paul Eklund continue to produce the AROO Cup Rally Series, which has only gained in popularity and challenge over the years. This typical two-hours-on-a-Sunday series has become one of AROO's longest running and popular annual events. And the latest spin-off – the "Dirty Rat" Rally – continues to be a favorite among many! Thank you both for your dedication and drive to keep these popular events alive and healthy!

Our cornerstone event, the Northwest Classic Rally, continues to evolve and improve, and is in great hands with Rally Chair Steve Davis and Rally Master Roger Dilts. The AROO Board has been very involved working to make next year's event a reality, despite huge obstacles with hotel availability and room and meal costs. After nearly two years of interruption, hotels are not motivated to negotiate high-season events as pent-up consumer demand has them catering to individuals over discounted group events. With two years of postponed events, the summer season in the Willamette Valley, Wine Country and on the Coast has made hotel space very expensive (some locations have doubled their room prices from 2020-quoted rates) and hard to find with multitudes of returning and new events on the season's calendar.

We anticipate the traditional format for the rally, tentatively held on the last weekend of July 2022, currently at a Willamette Valley hotel venue. Steve brings very relevant event management experience, as he has managed two previous AROC national conventions, and of course Roger brings untold experience producing entertaining and challenging rallies. And behind these two key individuals is an experienced team of AROO volunteers. We are looking forward to this coming year's NWC Rally, and we welcome your engagement as participants or volunteers!

Following this month's Board of Directors meeting, I am happy to announce that we have a full and engaged board! We welcome to the board our newest two directors: Dylan Dale (from Sisters), appointed to fill the final year of a twoyear term; and Patrick Iaboni, replacing retiring director John Clemson.

With a slate of five nominees for five open positions, no election was necessary, and the board accepted those five nominated individuals: returning for another two-year term are Chris Bright, Sue Halton, Glenn Dolphin and myself, and Patrick Iaboni begins his second (or is it third?) return to the Board in nearly 20 years. John Clemson retires after two consecutive two-year terms – thank you, John, for your volunteerism, your ideas and input and your help!






Initially Bob organized the club, and got it established as a local chapter of the AROC. Bob provided photography and copy for the AlfaBits, and later he served as its editor for many years. He founded the Old Spider Tour, an annual celebration of his then fortieth birthday and the purchase of Old Blue, his somewhat modified 1958 Giulietta spider. Margaret was always present, and always volunteering for various events. They were a charming couple – this annual award in their name is so fitting ~



1. Minutes (Sue Halton) No report.

2. Treasurer's Report (Cindy Banzer)

A. The Rally financials are just the same as last month.i. All the invoices presented have been cleared.

B. Tom McGirr has not submitted an invoice for the Fall Tour.

3. Past Events Report

A. Dirty Rat Rally--October 17th, 2021 (Paul Eklund and Yulia Smolski) .

i. John Clemson reported that the DRR Rally was devious and very well received.

4. Upcoming Event Report

A. November General Meeting (November 17th)
i. After discussion, the Board decided to hold a 'social' November General Membership meeting.

ii. Chris Bright will host the meeting.

B. The Holiday Party is scheduled for December 5th, 2021.

i. There will be a 'Jingle Drive', then casual food, beer and wine at Migrations.

ii. AROO will pay for the food, tip, and non-alcoholic beverages.

5. Board Membership

A. Mark Carpenter has resigned from the Board.

i. Chris Bright expressed the gratitude of the Board for

Mark's service.

- B. The terms of five Board Members are expiring. Four of the five will stand for a new term.
- i. John Clemson will retire.

C. Jim Guntner has stated that he intends to nominate someone to the Board.

C. Vaccination Policy for in-person, indoor events.

i. After discussion, Chris moved that "Out of an abundance of caution for our membership, at indoor events attendees are expected to be vaccinated for Covid 19, and to follow all other state and local requirements, including those of the establishment attended."

ii. Board members agreed to review the precise wording at the next Board meeting.

a. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

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Tour to the Rockies & More!

I plan car tours around what I want to see. This project started the same way with Rocky Mountain National Park being the destination (I want to see how the US Rockies stack up to the recently visited Canadian Rockies!). However, as I researched the route, I discovered a number of other really interesting national parks and monuments, historical sites, museums and spectacular scenic highways that were "on the way." In that a second road trip out here for me is unlikely, the result is a two-week drive planned for early September. Below is a summary of the draft itinerary with a few pictures of what we will see.

How I organize the trip will vary depending on how many folks would like to join us. I am leaning towards maintaining a tour list to manage the logistics and have each person/couple make their own lodging reservations from the suggested list I provide. This approach will allow folks to cancel, if needed, and get their lodging deposits back, subject to individual hotel policies. It also reduces the financial risk to me due to lodging contracts. I will still facilitate lunch and dinner arrangements as well as detailed route instructions. This approach provides the most flexibility in light of the unknowns of Covid, etc. However, it will require attendees to be proactive in following through with their lodging reservations EARLY as September will be a busy travel time and several of the destinations have limited facilities.

This will not be a particularly expensive trip as we are staying in motel/hotels vs resorts with lodging costs ranging from as low as \$90 to \$250 (average around \$175). Eating in regular restaurants will also save some money vs. resort food. There will be some admission fees at the museums. If you have or purchase a National Park Pass, it will cover most park fees. There will be a tour registration fee of up <u>to</u> \$350/couple-\$175/single to cover my lodging and meal costs. It will be billed 2 months prior to the tour or July 6. To the projected registration fees exceed projected costs (ie: lots of folks sign up). the actual registration fee billed will be reduced. There will be NO profit margin.

In any case, review the itinerary/pictures and <u>shoot me an e-</u> <u>mail if you are interested</u>. Tour date is planned for September 8-21. <u>Tomsredalfa@gmail.com</u> or 503-362-8597. Tour will have a limit of 20 couples and I will maintain an alternate list for last minute openings.



Day Four: The featured attraction today will be Fossil Butte National Monument in Wyoming. This place is referred to as 'America's Aquarium in Stone' and features a wide variety of fossils of all kinds. Thereafter, we drive through the scenic Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area to Vernal UT. Day Six: We drive one of the most scenic drives in the country. Top of the Rockies Scenic Hwy reaches a staggering 12,095 feet and is surrounded by multiple mountains over 13,000 feet! After lunch in Aspen, we drive another portion of the highway as head to Winter Park. We will cross three separate continental divides today!

Day Eight: Two major highlights today. Museum of the Fur Trade contains over 6000 items boasting to be the largest exhibit dedicated to the fur trade in the country. The museum also covers period native Indian culture. A club member who has visited here said it was "not to be missed." Thereafter, we drive through Badlands National Park on yet another national scenic highway. This place is one of the most rugged and staggeringly beautiful places you will ever see. We end our day in Wall, SD.

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




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
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

As in past years, we would like to encourage early registration, by both offering a "apply now, pay later" opportunity, and by offering a discounted entry fee for those early registrations.



1973 Spider Veloce \$5000

Current mileage: 182K* miles ?

Condition: Very strong running car with body and interior and top in good, mostly original condition and parts. Re-painted five years ago and a long list of rehab projects were performed to the running gear, suspension, body, and interior (listed below) over the 25 years I have owned it.

History: I purchased the car in 1996 from a nephew who was moving up from San Francisco. To the best of my knowledge the car had spent its life up to that point in the bay area. It was a bit tired looking and a lot of maintenance had been deferred. But like me in mid-life it appeared worth saving. We bonded. It was a daily driver (five miles to my office) for about three years. Since then it has been used only for occasional Sunday drives and spent most of the time since it was painted and restored in a barn in Washington.

Here is a list of the major things I have done, mostly in chronological order: (Except for a few small things I did myself, all mechanical work was done by Nasko, in Portland,

Rebuilt mechanical fuel injection pump Rebuilt transmission - synchro gears Clutch New heater core (under the dash) Wheel bearings Routine brakes U-joints Powder coated header pipes Complete mufflers and exhaust system refresh Rebuilt head with new valves, cams, etc. (purchased from International Auto) Electronic ignition upgrade Fuel pump and fuel lines and filters Complete brake rebuild - all wheels disks, rotors, drums, master cylinder Front suspension New radiator Gas tank removed, cleaned and repainted

Interior

Replaced drivers seat upholstery and cleaned up operating framework of both seats Doors rehabbed including window crank mechanisms, door handle operation, upholstery panels, replaced rubber seals all around

Cleaned up and replaced a couple cracked shrouding pieces around center console Cleaned up floor panels under original rubber mats (No rust here or other spots in the body) New StayFast top installed by Guy's Interior Restoration on refurbished frame Added convertible top boot Dash cover (dash is cracked in all the usual sun drenched places)

Body

At about 175K miles I took the car off the road and began a five-year project stripping down the paint which included rebuilding the interior working of both doors, hood and trunk latches, hinges, body trim, etc., and sanding the body panels nearly to the metal all around. I had the car painted off-site by a young man trained at Heitzman's in Beaverton (where my father worked as a body man for 40 years). I then reassembled the car including new window and door seals and some trim moldings. Camp. wheels with Pirelli tires at about 3,000 miles use.
